ORANGE CONES

An orange cone is front of you means the range is CLOSED. Never handle a firearm behind an orange cone.

HOLSTERS

Guests are not permitted to draw from the holster or move and shoot, - NO EXCEPTIONS.





MAXIMUM DISTANCE

Guests may NOT use the 600-yard range, - NO EXCEPTIONS.



COLD RANGE

A cold range means all ammunition sources are removed (including empty magazines) and a chamber flag is inserted. An orange cone must also be placed in front of the firing line to indicate the range is cold (closed). No touching firearms on a cold range, - NO EXCEPTIONS.



RANGE OFFICERS

If you have a question, please ask a range officer. Range officers are here to help keep everyone safe and are the final authority on the range.



WAIVERS

All guests must sign a waiver immediately upon entering ASC property – NO EXCEPTIONS.

GUEST PASS

Your host must supply you with a one-time use wristband. The wristband must be on your wrist while on ASC property. *(Exceptions apply for public events).*

EYES & EARS

Eye and ear protection are required at all times.





THE BASICS

Always follow the four basic firearm safety rules.

ALWAYS keep the gun pointed in a safe direction

This is the primary rule of gun safety. Common sense dictates the safest direction depending on different circumstances.



ALWAYS keep the gun unloaded until ready to use

If you do not know how to open the action or inspect the chamber, leave the gun alone and get help from someone who does.



ALWAYS keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot

When holding a gun, rest your finger alongside the frame and outside the trigger guard. Do not touch the trigger until you are actually ready to fire.



KNOW your target and what is beyond it

Be absolutely sure you have identified your target. Be aware of the area beyond your target. This means observing your prospective area of fire before you shoot. Never fire in a direction in which there are people or any other potential for mishaps.
